IMPACT STORY



Mr. Sunkari Dharmarao, a 48-year-old tailor residing in Bogguladabha, Vizianagaram district, who was diagnosed with leprosy eight months ago. Mr. Dharmarao is the son of Mr. Satyam and is a father to one son and one daughter. His life took an unexpected turn when he faced the challenges posed by leprosy, impacting his health, social life, finances, and mental well-being. Despite these obstacles, his journey toward recovery and resilience serves as an inspiring example of overcoming adversity.

Problems Faced:

Mr. Sunkari Dharmarao encountered a myriad of challenges following his diagnosis of leprosy.

Health issues loomed large as he grappled with the disease, leading to the premature onset of footdrop. His condition worsened with a Type I reaction during his treatment, affecting his overall well-being. Yet, the challenges extended beyond the physical realm. The diagnosis carried a heavy burden of social stigma, inducing self-shame and isolation, particularly due to visible symptoms like footdrop. This self-stigma impeded his ability to engage in regular social activities and fulfill his usual responsibilities. Moreover, leprosy inflicted an economic setback as he lost two months' worth of income due to his condition, exacerbating financial strain. His psychological distress deepened as he chose to conceal his medical status from his family, compounding the emotional toll of his predicament.

Lepra's Intervention:

Mr. Dharmarao sought assistance at our Resource Centre (RC) when he began experiencing anesthesia in his feet. At the RC, his foot measurements were taken, and he was provided with MCR footwear. He received education on self-care practices and was encouraged to visit the referral centre for follow-up services.

Subsequently, a physiotherapist conducted an assessment and noted changes in his gait pattern while walking, indicating the onset of early footdrop in his right foot. Accordingly, a physiotherapy treatment plan was initiated. This treatment included muscle stimulation for the right foot, towel exercises, stretching routines, and home exercises, all of which were thoroughly explained and demonstrated to the patient.

Changes After Lepra Intervention:

Through consistent follow-ups and physiotherapy sessions, Mr. Dharmarao's walking pattern gradually returned to a normal state. He expressed deep gratitude for Lepra's intervention and is now contentedly back at work, leading a happy life with his family members.

STATE WISE UPDATES

ANDHRA PRADESH • Fifty bed nets were allocated and distributed within the Guravaiah colony slum areas in Tenali, with active participation

from both the AMO (Assistant Medical Officer) and the Filaria unit staff.

- · EVA footwear was distributed to individuals afflicted with LF (Lymphatic Filariasis) in the Tenali AMO (Assistant Medical Officer) Office, with active participation from the AMO and other staff members from the Filaria unit during the program.
- A Rapid Enquiry Survey was conducted within the urban area of Machilipatnam with the aim of identifying early and concealed cases while simultaneously fostering community awareness.
- An ASHA orientation program was executed at Marpalli PHC in Vizianagaram District, with a total of 72 participants including 56 ASHAs, 16 general health staff members, and NLEP (National Leprosy Eradication Program) personnel.



BIHAR REGION On September 20, high-burden districts Samastipur and Lakhisarai in Bihar initiated the MDA campaign, known as IDA regimen, to combat Lymphatic Filariasis, mobilizing community participation and students from the Engineering College. Bihar is exceeding global targets to prevent disability and economic hardship caused by this mosquito-borne disease.

· A District Coordination Committee meeting, led by the District Magistrate, Samastipur Collectorate, involved multiple departments and partners to enhance MDA uptake and Dengue prevention.

Twin strategies, Mass Drug Administration (MDA) to stop transmission and Morbidity Management and Disability Prevention (MMDP), are embraced for LF elimination. At Dr. Rajendra Prasad Central Agriculture University, Pusa Samastipur, students, faculty, and staff attended a session led by LEPRA, WHO Zonal Coordinator, and Vector-Borne Disease Control Officer (VBDCO). They discussed the 3-drug regimen and a comprehensive five-pronged approach for LF eradication.

Overall, in the month of September a total of 1257 Nerve Function Assessments

were done

CHHATTISGARH

A training session on ulcer care was conducted at the Nangur Primary Health Center (PHC) in Jagdalpur, located in the Bastar district of Chhattisgarh state. Ten ulcer beneficiaries, along with ASHA (Accredited Social Health Activist) workers, participated in the training. The session included a demonstration of self-care techniques, and dressing kits were distributed to facilitate proper wound management.





MADHYA PRADESH SSG meetings involve consistent interactions with the block coordinator to enhance a supportive network, foster collaboration, and share knowledge among SSGs. This collective effort enhances health and well-being in Rajnagar, Lavkushnagar, and Gaurihar blocks. Additionally, SSG members consult with a doctor for ulcer care during these meetings.

· In collaboration with the local NMA, a leprosy and LF awareness session was organized at Rajnagar Block School. Over 25 students participated, receiving information and self-care guidance from Mr. Arjun Chaudhary, the block coordinator.

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ODISHA

Dr. Acharya visited MMDP Kanas to provide medical care for individuals experiencing acute LF attacks. During the visit, he engaged in a

discussion with the medical officer at Kanas CHC regarding the management of these acute episodes.

- · Lepra Society partnered with the Health Department to conduct an awareness initiative in Naibhua village, situated within the Puri Sadar block. The program's primary objective was to enlighten the community about the social stigma surrounding individuals affected by leprosy.
- 2 MMDP Clinic & Self-care camps were arranged in Nabarangpur & Koraput Districts, benefiting 42 individuals with disabilities due to cured leprosy. Attendees received essential provisions such as footwear, ulcer kits, and adaptive and protective devices.
- · Mayurlep Community Health Project Shoe Unit was officially inaugurated at the Lepra Office Premises in Rairangpur. The event was honored by the attendance of ADPHEO (NLEP) and ADPHEO (NVBDCP)
